About Us

This statement is designed to provide information on locally available services and workforce solutions for civil and construction companies wishing to tender and engage in works in the shire of Kowanyama.

Our Council

Kowanyama means "place of many waters" in the Yir Yoront language. The community includes the Kokoberra, Yir Yoront [or Kokomenjen] and Kunjen clans, who each have language and other cultural differences. Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire consists of beautiful and unique wetlands and delta mangroves in the north, extending to forest country of the central peninsula.

Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire is administered by the Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council in accordance with the Local Government Act 2009. Council has an elected Mayor and Councillors who work closely with an Executive Team to deliver services to the community.

Kowanyama Community

Kowanyama lies 25 km (as the crow flies) from the east coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria in the south-western region of the Cape York Peninsula, and 600 km northwest of Cairns. The total area equals approximately 4,120 square kilometres. The community has a population of approximately 1200 people.

The community is based on the banks of Magnificent Creek, which joins the South Mitchell River, which in turn forms part of the Mitchell River Delta. Road access is only available four to five months of the year in the dry season.

About Kowanyama

Our Nature & Environment

Kowanyama has a rich abundance of nature and wildlife. Kowanyama consists mainly of wetlands and delta mangroves in the north, extending to forest country of the central peninsula. These unique natural environments are home to a vast array of bird and animal species.

Climate

Kowanyama experiences extreme heat during the annual wet season with very high temperatures and rainfall. The wet season runs from December to April and is characterized by frequent torrential downpours and high humidity. During the dry season, almost no rainfalls and days are warm to hot, but humidity is low and the nights can become quite mild.

Population

With a population just over 1000 people, Kowanyama is one of the largest communities on the Cape York peninsula. Most residents are Traditional Owners. The community includes the Kokoberra, Yir Yoront (or Kokomenjen) and Kunjen clans, who each have language and other cultural differences. Language groups associated with the Kowanyama region include Yir Yoront, Yirrk Thangalkl, Koko Bera, Uw Oykangand, and Olkola. English is also widely spoken.

Accessibility & Remoteness

Kowanyama has stunning ecological diversity, with a wide variety of fauna, that includes but is not limited to:

- Kangaroos and Wallabies
- Possums and Gliders
- Bats and Flying Foxes
- Dingoes and other introduced Cape York Wildlife
- Parrots and Cockatoos
- Kookaburra and other Kingfishers
- Jabirus and Broglas
- Birds of Prey
- Honeyeaters
- Saltwater Crocodiles
- Turtles
- Lizards, Skinks and Geckos
- Monitors and Goannas
- Snakes
- Frogs

Accessibility & Remoteness

The Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia rates Kowanyama as Remote (4), meaning there is very restricted access to goods and services. Subject to road conditions and your vehicle's capability, Kowanyama can be accessed by road from Cairns via Mareeba and Chillagoe. However, during the wet season (November to April), some or all these roads may be closed. Motorists should be aware that the there is no fuel available in the 400km between Chillagoe and Kowanyama.

You can also fly to Kowanyama Airport from Cairns (CNS). Hinterland Aviation and Skytrans operate scheduled flights on selected weekdays.

Additional Information

Alcohol Restrictions

Kowanyama has an Alcohol Management Plan (AMP) in place. The Kowanyama restricted area is the Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire including all public and private places. This includes the Errk Oykangand National Park (formerly known as the Mitchell-Alice Rivers National Park) and the Mitchell River and the Northern sides of Topsy Creek, Northern and Southern sides of Coleman River, the rest of the Topsy Creek waterway and the other parts of the Coleman River are not part of the restricted area. QIPP an Indigenous business is at least fifty per cent owned by Aboriginal


Queensland Government Building & Construction Policy

As well as providing apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities and developing the skills of workers in the building and construction industry, the Training Policy also as a strong focus on increasing the economic independence of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.



Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council's Building and Civil Construction Services department employs a skilled workforce of local people in varied trades to undertake their own work programs. External contractor's are encouraged to discuss with Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council, any opportunities to provide additional employment and upskilling for local Council and community residents on all infrastructure projects being in and regional to Kowanyama.

Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council has established building specific business units which currently undertakes the upgrade and responsive maintenance programs for the social housing stock in community, civil based projects within and around the township of Kowanyama, and other agencies building projects.

Our carpentry workforce compromises of Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council tradesmen, sub-contractor's, apprentices and semi-skilled general labourers with formal qualifications and practical carpentry experiences. Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council can undertake all carpentry repairs, maintenance and most new constructions or builds.

The Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council has established it's own workforce of Plumbers, as well as contractors in the community. These contractor's employ local community members, and provide a high quality of plumbing services for all upgrades and responsive maintenance requirements to the community. electrician that provides services to the Council and community during peak periods. The Council has established a set costing to fully fit out new homes with all the required electrical services, a well established concrete batching plant. The batching plan has the capacity to produce approximately 80 cubes of concrete per day.



Getting Here

You can travel to Kowanyama either by air (flight) or via road during the Dry Season:

Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council's Contractor's Camp is located on Karrenganang Street. This facility offers a variety of room options, ensuring that contractor's visiting the Kowanyama community for the delivery of building and essential trade services, are provided with a safe and secure accommodation facility.

Please note that:

- Each room is equipped with a private ensuite, with shared cooking and laundry facilities available for use.
- Bookings must be made at least 48 hours in advance.
- Keys for this accommodation facility are collected from the main Council Office, located at 30 Chapman Road, Kowanyama.
- For arrivals after 5.00pm Monday Thursday, after 12.00pm Friday, or during weekends and Public Holidays, an alternate key collection method can be arranged, although prior notice must be given.

Kowanyama is accessible via Mareeba and Chillagoe along the Burke Development and Kowanyama Roads to reach our serene location. Majority of the road is dirt, and travel time from Cairns varies from 8-10 hours depending on road conditions. It is also possible to access Kowanyama by road from the south via Kurumba and Normanton.

A four wheel drive vehicle is recommended for getting to Kowanyama, with roads only officially open and accessible during the dry season. It is recommended to check road conditions and closures before your travels via the Transport & Main Roads and Queensland Traffic websites.



The Kowanyama Airport is located lkm out of the township, and is operated by the Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council. Scheduled flights to Kowanyama (KWM) depart from Cairns (CNS).

Both Hinterland Aviation and Skytrans operate scheduled flights on selected weekdays. Please check airlines for flight schedules.

Please note there are no public transport services available in Kowanyama.
